BISHOP TO LEAD PILGRIMAGE TO LITHUANIA

The Most Reverend James C. Timlin, Bishop of the Diocese of Scranton, PA, has announced that he will lead a pilgrimage to Lithuania in 1996 to mark the fifth anniversary of that country's independence from the Soviet Union.

The pilgrimage will include Masses and religious ceremonies at Lithuania's notable shrines which were included in Pope John Paul II's historic visit to that country in 1993.

Arrangements for the pilgrimage are being handled by Baltic Tours, based in Massachusetts. The pilgrims are scheduled to depart from JFK International Airport on Wednesday, July 10, 1996 and return on Friday, July 19, 1996.

Bishop Timlin plans to celebrate Mass at the Hill of Crosses in Siauliai, one of the holy places where Pope John Paul II offered Mass during his visit in 1993.

The price of the pilgrimage is \$1,999 per person. This includes airfare, first-class hotel accommodations with private bath, and three meals daily, tours, guides and entrance fees.

You put in a hard day at the office and then contend with the busy traffic on the way home. Pulling in the driveway, you anticipate the comfort that awaits you in the peace and quiet of the privacy of your home.

You change into something comfortable, begin to prepare your evening meal and anticipate sitting down to enjoy it when the ringing begins

Leaving the pan on the stove which if unattended could scorch your evening meal, you pick up the receiver and hear a perky little voice greet you with, "Hi Mrs. Jones, and how are you today?"

Upset over the interruption you reply, "I was doing fine until the phone rang."

"Oh, is Mr. Jones in?" the sweet thing asks. "No he hasn't been here for quite some time now," you reply, "try dialing H-E-A-V-E-N

Next you have the anonymous calls. You get up from the table, answer, and find no one on the line.

These are the most disturbing simply because each time you refrain from answering and then dial star 69 to find out where the call originated you're informed it came from outside the calling area.

With this continuing day after day, you begin to wonder just who is making these calls and for what reason. You call the telephone company to find out what steps can be taken to remedy this situation.

Trying to find out why anyone would place toll calls and then hang up you are enlightened by the explanation from the telephone company

The telemarketing industry has come up with a new technology referred to as "predictive dialing". The predictive dialers make the connection between the telemarketers and you — the

potential customer.

No longer are operators bothered with dialing phone numbers, wasting time on dial tones, ringing phones or busy signals. Equipped with headsets, they simply rely on the machine to connect them to a prospective customer, (YOU). If all the operators are busy when the machine reaches you and it can't connect you to an available operator, the "predictive dialer" hangs up. As a result, you think you're receiving harassing or anonymous calls.

There is a law that protects the consumer which gives you the right to demand to be put on a list eliminating you from receiving these calls and all companies must honor this list.

An organization in the state of Illinois is mobilized to secure greater regulatory controls over these unsolicited calls and junk mail. If interested dial: 1-800-CUT JUNK.

Classes of Policies

Life Paid Up at Age 80: This is low-cost life insurance which is fully paid up when the insured reaches the anniversary nearest age 80 years.

20 Payment Life: Premiums are paid for 20 full years after which further payment of premiums cease and policy is fully paid up.
