THE BISHOP'S TRAVELS

During the first half of 1995 Bishop Paul Baltakis, OFM travelled to a number of Lithuanian communities in the U.S., Canada, South America, Germany and Lithuania. He attended the Knights of Lithuania Convention and the 75th anniversay of St. Anthony's Parish in Detroit, MI on August 13.

From September 15 to October 4 he embarked on a long promised visit to Russia and places in Siberia marked with the sign of Calvary. Back in the states on October 4, he participated in Pope John Paul's reception

in New York. On October 8-10 he attended the annual meetings of the Lithuanian Catholic Religious Aid and U.S.Lithuanian Priest's League in Putnam, CT. On October 15, he officiated at the centenary celebration of St. Francis of Assisi parish in Minersville, PA. From October 17 to November 10 the bishop again journeyed to Lithuania to make apostolic visitations to Lithuania's three seminaries.

LITHUANIANS IN MOSCOW & SIBERIA

In the course of carrying out Pope John Paul's charge to minister to the pastoral needs of all Lithuanians living outside Lithuania's borders, Bishop Paul A. Baltakis, OFM, undertook to visit his companions in what was once the Soviet Union and its satellites. The Bishop met with Lithuanians in Moscow and Siberia and familiarized himself with their cultural and social endeavors and their pastoral needs.

Moscow has a population of approximately 3,500 Lithuanians. Though some are in ethnic or religious mixed marriages, they continue to be actively involved in the Lithuanian community. St. Louis, the only Catholic church to remain open throughout the Soviet years, belongs to the French Embassy and serves the needs of the Lithuanian community. The church and property are extremely run down, but the Apostolic Administrator for Russia, Archbishop Tadas Kondrusecivius has been unable to secure French Embassy permission for repairs. The church has missals and praverbooks printed in Lithuania, but the parish is presently staffed by two Polish priests. A set of the Lithuanian Encyclopedia published in the U.S. and visits at least two or three times a year by a Lithuanian priest are the foremost needs of the Lithuanian Community in Moscow.

Siberia has a population of about 40,000 Lithuanians. During the mass 1941 Soviet deportations, some 400,000 Lithuanians, including 300 priests, were exiled in several waves to Siberia and neighboring Soviet republics. In 1956 these exiles were rehabilitated and some returned to Lithuania. Those not allowed to live in Lithuania settled in the Kaliningrad District, St. Petersburg, Moscow and elsewhere.

Most stayed in Siberia because of jobs, mixed marriages or the difficulty of starting over again in an independent though still struggling Lithuania. Some 800 families filed requests in 1993 to return to Lithuania, but quite a number of former exiles go back to Siberia because living conditions are better there than in Lithuania.

Novosibirsk, the present-day capital of Siberia, is a city of two million inhabitants. Lithuanians were not sent here as exiles, but settled at a later time. About 900 Lithuanians were registered in 1989.

Years ago Franciscan Father Saulius Bytautas built a church in Novosibirsk which is now served by Franciscans of other nationalities. On Sundays, an average of about six Lithuanians gather in a wooden chapel next to the Cathedral under construction. Every other Sunday the readings are in Lithuanian and traditional Lithuanian hymns are sung. About 40 Lithuanians gathered to welcome Bishop Baltakis at a Mass and reception.

Most Lithuanians who have stayed in Siberia and elsewhere in Russia are not visibly religious. The local clergy see few Lithuanians at Masses and parish functions. The main reasons people have drifted from the Church are that they are dispersed over wide areas, live long distances from churches, have formed mixed families and most significantly have no regular visits by Lithuanian priests who could encourage them to become acquainted and organized.

Lithuanians everywhere are pleading for Lithuanian priests to visit them a minimum of twice yearly. They also ask for Lithuanian publications, videotapes about Lithuanian holidays, celebrations and festivals which would motivate them to assemble more frequently and uphold Lithuanian and Catholic traditions,

The bishops of Russia and Kazakhstan and the priests who toil in Siberia pointed out that Lithuanians have settled everywhere, from Murmansk to Vladivostok, but they need ethnic and religious support.

The first meeting of the newly appointed Executive Committee was held at the Home Office September 20, 1995

At the opening of the meeting, Director Charles Liscosky resigned his elected position on the Board and his appointed position on the Executive Committee. This leaves the present Board with six members and the Executive Committee with four.

Alena Miskinis presented the members with a thorough, detailed summary of all Home Office financial transactions,

President Mack opened discussion on the need for a qualified person to assume the duties of Executive Director. Florence Eckert joined the meeting and gave a report on her contacts with a few retired servicemens organizations. Alena furnished the Board with a job description for this position and reminded the board that she had agreed to remain as acting office manager only until November 1, 1995.

Leocadia suggested a letter be sent pastors in the Wilkes-Barre area asking they place a notice for this position of Executive Director in their Sunday bulletins.

A motion was approved to increase Single Premium rates by \$25 per \$1,000 of insurance to fall in line with the rates charged by most other fraternals.

Alena and Florence brought to the attention of the Board the need for a new copy machine. A motion was approved for Rosalie and George to meet with Florence and make a decision on the purchase of a copier.

Several letters requesting donations were tabled due to unavailable funds at this time.

With no further business, the meeting was adjourned.
