



Endorse Workers' Social Insurance Bill H.R. 7598

In the last few issues of the Laisve and Tiesa Youth Sections. articles have appeared explaining in detail what the Social and Unemployment Insurance Bill H. R. 7598 means to the workers. If this bill is passed in Congress, it will mean that in case of unemployment, sickness, accident, old age, or maternity, workers would receive insurance from the government. The money for this purpose would be raised by taxing incomes of \$5,000 or more a year. The relief would be administered by unemployment insurance commissions of rank and file members of workers' organizations. Every organization, both youth

Aren't the morning papers all full of box scores of their favorite professional baseball team's exhibition training camp game scores? Isn't the paper full of such "sickening" news items as "CHOCRANE IS ILL; FEAR APPENDICITIS". Then, comes the question of the kids playing in the street. As early as the first time this spring when the snow melted, or even earlier, kids and youths, young men, were tossing around the "pill."

Baseball season is here. Right on the heels of the basketball season. And we have to do something about it! Yessir, and we are, too.

The National Sports Committee of the N.L.Y.C. is now preparing to intensify the baseball activity. They are urging every district to call conferences of as many baseball clubs and LDS Youth Branches, and our choruses as possible in our movement to form baseball teams.

They urge that these clubs have INDOOR BALL instead of the regular baseball so that too much of a financial burden would not be placed on the clubs and because the Labor Sports Union is planning our own "World Series" in indoor ball.

They have planned out that since many of our leading bodies have very little experience in forming baseball leagues (or any other leagues for that matter) that each district should get a copy of the pamphlet issued by the Labor Sports Union on "How To Build a Baseball League." With the aid of the experiences of the LSU in this matter we should have a number of leagues. Plan out your work, comrades, and write to the NLYC Sports Department for help. Also keep in touch with the District Boards of the Labor Sports Union in your territory for help.

By the time we go to press, we should have a definite answer from the Elizabeth Vanguards as to whether they shall accept the fair decision of the National Lithuanian Youth Committee in the matter of the playoff game between the Elizabeth Vanguards and the Linden Victors for the New York-New Jersey Basketball Tournament. Probably, the next issue of the youth section will carry the place of the game. The whole district wanted to see a playoff and we hope that they will mobilize themselves to come and see the champs win the game. The best team is sure to win. Fair and impartial referees will officiate the game, so neither side of the controversy will have anything to fear.

Now, to roam into the New England district. We have advised time and again that the New England District Sports Directors get in touch with the District Labor Sports Union Board. So far, reports state that the LSU knows practically nothing about the matter. We do not and cannot expect to build a successful sports movement without the aid of the LSU, and the comrades should write to the district secretary of the LSU immediately and start to plan out their baseball season. Break the Chains!

Comrades, after singing a song containing one of the following phrases, "Sacco-Venzetti, Scottsboro case," "Mooney-Billings, Scotssboro boys," etc., have you ever stopped to wonder just what the fate of these prisoners is? What have you done to aid them? The singing of songs alone, although it goes a long way in stirring up the masses to defend these prisoners, is not sufficient. An article by S. Small enlightens us on some of the hardships our heroic working-class leaders have to endure in prison.

"If you talk to any prison warden in this country, or to any of the officials of the prison regime, you will be told that there is no such thing as a

political prisoner—except in war time.

During the war, those who refuse to fight in the armies of imperialism and who try to influence other workers not to take arms against their fellow-workers; those, are given the privilege of being recognized as political prisoners—as offenders against the State.

SHELLEY "On the other hand, working-class leaders—workers, who dare oppose the starvation program laid out for them by the government; workers, who dare fight the police and militia that the government sends against them to force them to submit to this program—are thrown into jail charged with anything from "littering the streets," "obstructing traffic," "disorderly conduct", all the way to "rape" and "murder."

"During the trials of these workers, witnesses, stool-pigeons, police and newspaper reporters brand them as Reds, as dangerous enemies of civilization (in spite of the fact that the workers are supposedly on trial for one of the above mentioned offenses). As soon as the boss-ruled courts have railroaded them to jail, these prisoners become offenders against the penal law and are treated as such.

"Working-class fighters like Tom Mooney, Angelo Herndon, or J. B. McNamara, are forced to mingle with criminal degenerates, forced to do back-breaking work in the prison mills, or forced to rot in solitary, confinement.

"These workers are not allowed to receive workingclass literature. Their correspondence with the outside world is limited and censored. They are forbidden to communicate with their organizations. They lose their identity and become merely a number as far as the prison authorities are concerned.

"In many European countries, political prisoners are recognized as such, and are given special privileges. It is true that this may mean also, special torture and special discrimination. Yet, even by this torture, the officials and the governments of those countries are forced to admit that these prisoners are being prosecuted because they are in opposition to the existing system.

"In this 'free country', where workers are beaten when they ask for bread, when picket lines are broken up with tear gas bombs—even though there may be women and children there, where nine Negro boys are tortured in jail on a trumped-up charge of rape (denied many times and to the whole world by one of the supposed victims), there is no such thing as a political prisoner—according to the officials.

"However, workers are not so finicky about definitions. They understand why they are being persecuted. The International Labor Defense has organized a campaign for the recognition of the political status of class-war prisoners in this country. It calls upon all workers and friends of the working-class to be in this campaign."


