CHILDREN SHOULD BE TAUGHT NOT TO RUB EYES

Rubbing eyes with dirty hands and using dirty towels are ways of causing eye trouble, states the Sight Saving Council.

Parents should teach little children about this. Summer time is play time and children's hands get very dirty in sand piles, marbles and other games. Towels used to wipe the child after a swim may unwittingly be used to wipe wet eyes.

Children should acquire the habit of keeping their hands away from faces, particularly their eyes, and of using their own clean towels, the council reminds parents.

Parents should also insist that children read under good light or not at all. They will read by the fading light of evening until the black shadows lie on their books. Eyes are so accommodating to the situation imposed upon them that it is not until too late that people discover they have done their utmost and can do no more.

TWO CURES ANNOUNCED BY MEDICAL BUREAU AT LOURDES

PARIS. — Announcement has just been made of two cures at Lourdes which occurred in the "month of Mary," one in May of last year, announced and attested by the Bureau of Medical Verification at Lourdes, and the other in May of this year, reported by Dr. Vallett, president of the bureau, but not authenticated as yet. The bureau does not authenticate a cure until at least one year has elapsed.

The latter case is that of Mlle. Marie Bosch, who, going to Lourdes with the pilgrimage from Lyon, was cured suddenly on May 27 after having suffered from paralysis of her lower limbs for two years. For months she had been unable to leave her bed. It was during the blessing of the sick, a feature of the procession of the Blessed Sacrament, that she experienced a sensation of shock in her spinal column and strength returning to her legs. Her paralysis followed Pott's disease and during her stay in a sanatorium in southern France, grew constantly worse.

On May 28 Mademoiselle was examined by physicians who accompanied the Lyon pilgrimage and very particularly by a member of the Lourdes bureau staff, a nerve specialist. Apparently the cure was completely cured.

The cure of Mme. Pauxvielle of St. Vincent de Paul, Les Landes, from an extremely serious stomach ulcer occurred on May 29, 1936. She experienced a feeling of well being while being bathed in the Lourdes water. Ten days later she was able to leave the hospital and her health has continued good since then. She had been practically helpless for seven years due to the seriousness of her infirmity, but she has resumed her active life within her home and eats the same food as other members of her family.

The Bureau of Medical Verification has pronounced this cure miraculous because of the instantaneousness of relief and the absolute absence of a convalescent period.

NATIVE OF WOOSTER NAMED CHIEF OF ARMY CHAPLAINS

WASHINGTON. — Chaplain William Richard Arnold, U. S. A., a native of Wooster O., has been named by President Roosevelt to be chief of chaplains of the United States Army. He will be the first Catholic chaplain to hold that office.

Father Arnold, who recently has served as Chaplain to the First Cavalry Division with headquarters at Fort Bliss, Tex., and then as director of the Chaplain's School, Fort Leavenworth, Kan., has the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. He will have the rank of Colonel beginning Dec. 23, when he succeeds Chaplain Alva J. Brasted.

Chaplain Arnold, a priest of the Fort Wayne diocese, was born at Wooster, O., June 10, 1881. He attended St. Joseph's college at Collegeville, Ind., and St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester, N.Y. He was ordained to the priesthood on June 8, 1908, and was appointed a chaplain in the army on May 7, 1913, with the rank of first lieutenant. After promotion through the various grades, he was made lieutenant colonel in 1933. His first assignment after joining the Chaplains' Corps was at Fort Washington, Md. He has since served in the Philippines, at Fort Winfield Scott, Cal., Camp Zachary Taylor, Ky, where he was instructed in the Chaplain's School in 1918; Fort Hancock, N. J., Fort Wayne, Mich., and Fort Leavenworth.

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
